In order to determine if you should contact **Health Links – Info Santé** (204-788-8200 or toll-free at 1-888-315-9257) or seek other medical advice, you will be asked to respond to a few questions.

Public health officials also strongly urge anyone who has cold or flu-like symptoms, **such as a cough, fever, runny nose, sore throat, headache,** or any of the symptoms listed in the screening tool to isolate and get tested for COVID-19. By getting tested, you are helping to keep your family and community healthy.

We got to ride on a huge Maple Bus Lines bus and sit with a friend. We talked and slept on the large and comfy bus. It took us about half an hour to get to the northern site.

We organized into our groups with our team leaders from UCN. The women all had beautiful, Indigenous ribbon skirts. Safety instructions were given and we walked into the forest to the site. We began our day around a sacred circle where everyone was welcomed by Mrs. Dykun from the School Board Office who worked very hard to organize such a wonderful day. There were several elders from a variety of communities and other SDML staff from the School Board Office who volunteered their time as well.


The first activity I enjoyed was, Traditional Indigenous Games with Blair! My favourite part was throat singing "Old MacDonald"! The second activity I really loved was, drumming because we learned many different techniques. The last activity I enjoyed was building a tipi. We learned that each pole has a name like, hope or empathy.

A funny moment that made me laugh out loud was when Gabriel referred to our UCN guide as a wizard. Another hilarious moment was at Traditional Games when we learned different ways to protect ourselves, Ms. McCartney and Cynthia had to battle with pool noodles!

One of the things I learned was the names of the Indigenous plants and how they are used as medicine for different illnesses. Another important thing I learned was that sweat lodges are used for praying and feeling better mentally. They were used in the past and are used now.

The first heartfelt lesson I will always remember is that Indigenous people were denied their language and culture. The second heartfelt lesson I will remember is that Orange Shirt Day is based on a real person. She went to residential school and her beautiful orange blouse was taken away. It meant so much to her because her granny gave it to her. She was forced to wear the clothes at the school.

A huge thank-you to all of the elders, UCN students, Ms. Dykun, SDML staff, and our very own amazing Ms. McCartney and incredible Ms. Osberg! We had an awesome day of learning and fun!

Since the beginning of September, the grade eights have been reading/studying "The Secret Path" as a way of learning about Residential Schools. "The Secret Path" is a ten-song album written by Gord Downie (lead singer from Tragically Hip) with a graphic novel by illustrator Jeff Lemire that tells the true story of a 12 year old boy named Chanie Wenjack (misnamed Charlie by his teachers). Chanie unfortunately passes away as he walked a set of railroad tracks, escaping from the Cecilia Jeffery Indian Residential School in Kenora, Ontario. He didn't know how to get home or where he was going.

The grade eights and Ms. Grant really wanted to get in touch with Chanie's family to send their condolences, thoughts and prayers. Ms. Grant reached out to the "Gord Downie and Chanie Wenjack Fund" where she got the address of the Wenjack sister- Pearle Wenjack. The grade eights and Ms. Grant have spent many classes writing letters to the Wenjack family. We believe as a grade eight class and learning about Residential Schools will help create a path towards reconciliation between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people. We want to build awareness, educate and make connections between all people of Canada. So, in order to make these connections, we started the letter writing. The letters are heartfelt and the students put forth the effort and thoughts into writing these letters on their own. As hauntingly sad, real and painful as this may be, Residential Schools are one aspect of our Canadian history that must not be forgotten. The grade eights have learned so much from this book and we all agree that we can never let this happen again in our country.
